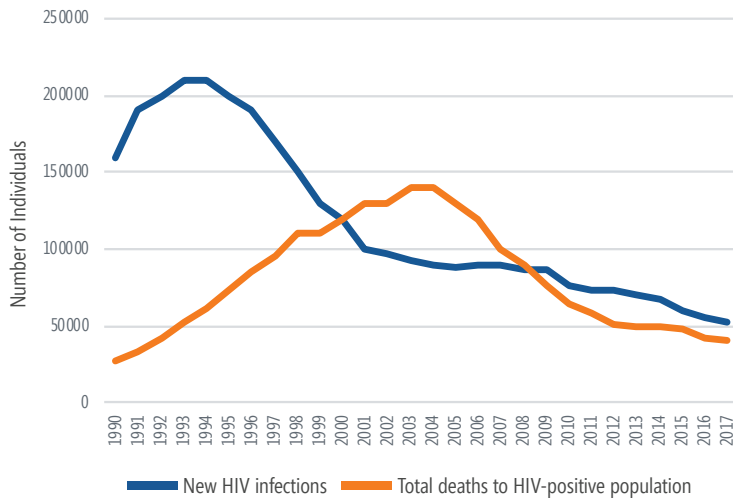


Kenya

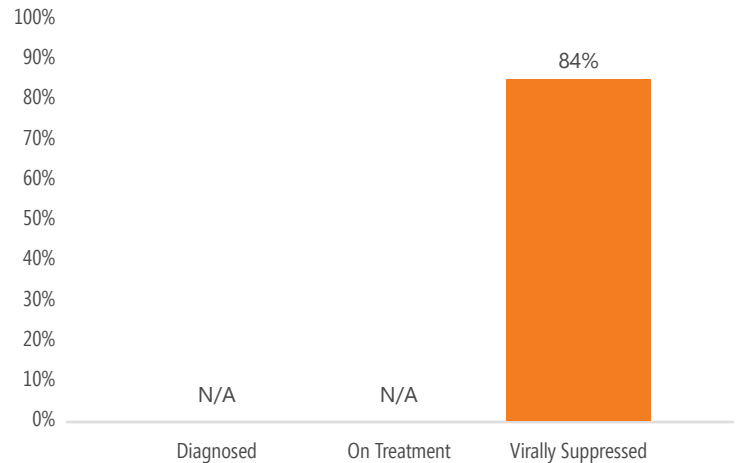
The U.S. government, through the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), is partnering with the people and the Government of Kenya to accelerate progress toward achieving HIV/AIDS epidemic control, with a focus on the following priorities:

- Focusing on highest-burden counties that constitute most of national gap toward reaching saturation, scaling up the most efficient and effective testing strategies to reach people living with HIV that remain underserved, namely men and youth
- Reducing HIV incidence among adolescent girls and young women (AGYW) through primary prevention via Determined, Resilient, Empowered, AIDS-free, Mentored, and Safe (DREAMS) programs and other AGYW-targeted interventions
- Scaling evidence-based primary prevention to reach young men with voluntary medical male circumcision
- Improving outcomes for orphans and vulnerable children by linking beneficiaries to DREAMS activities, clinical services, and household economic strengthening
- Identifying priority gaps and generating quality data by working alongside the Government of Kenya to improve key population size estimates and use Kenya's Population-Based HIV Impact Assessment (KENPHIA) results to inform programs
- Strengthening government financial contributions to the HIV response, county-level governance, supply chain systems, and bridge DATIM and DHIS2 data systems for better decision-making

Cumulative PEPFAR Results in Kenya (through June 2018)

- Antiretroviral treatment for **2,171,464** people
- Voluntary medical male circumcision for **992,492** men
- HIV testing services for **20,158,369** people*
- Care and support for **1,659,589** orphans, vulnerable children, and their caregivers
